1. Call to Order

Mr. Grant, Chairperson, called the meeting to order at 7:05 p.m.

Mr. Grant extended congratulations to Mr. Sterling Willis who was recently elected Rural Representative for Newfoundland and Labrador for the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM).

He continued that Mr. Galgay is standing for election for Vice President, Municipalities Newfoundland and Labrador (MNL) and passed along best wishes on behalf of the board.

2. Adoption of Agenda

It was moved and seconded (S Whalen/G Stone) to adopt the agenda as tabled. MOTION 2015-037: Carried (unanimously)

3. Review of Minutes – June 24, 2015

It was moved and seconded (G Stone/D O'Keefe) that the minutes of the June 24, 2015 meeting be adopted as tabled.

MOTION 2015-038: Carried (unanimously)

4. Committee Reports

- a) Finance & Audit Committee D Breen, Chairperson
 - i. Cheque Register and Payroll Summary for June and July 2015 Mr. Breen stated that the cheque register and payroll summary for June and July 2015 are included in tonight's meeting package (Appendix A). The Canada Revenue Agency statement of account for our payroll remittances is also included. No issues have been identified.

It was moved and seconded (D Breen/J Galgay) to adopt the cheque registers and payroll summary for June and July 2015 as tabled.

MOTION 2015-039: Carried (unanimously)

ii. Change in Terms of Contract with Newco Metal and Auto Recycling Ltd. for Metal Recyclables - Mr. Breen directed members to the briefing note and letter included in tonight's meeting package (Appendix B). The contractor, Newco Metal and Auto Recycling Ltd. (Newco) claims that the global slowdown in commodities is affecting its financial sustainability and its ability to continue under the current terms of the contract with the Board. Newco contracted to pay \$156.00 plus HST per tonne for metals collected at the waste recovery facilities (WRF). This was based on Newco achieving a price of \$240.00 per tonne at its buyer in Montreal.

The letter from Newco enclosed in tonight's meeting package includes supporting documentation confirming that they are currently achieving prices of \$140.00 per tonne from its buyer in Montreal as of July 2015.

The options discussed at committee were:

- Agreement by both parties to amend the terms of the contract as proposed by the contractor;
- Press contractor to fulfill terms or claim breach and sue contractor not likely to get the
 material moved off site and may have to leave material until issue is resolved significant
 operational impact on the WRFs; and,

 Agreement by both parties that contract is impaired; contract to be terminated by both parties – no fault and the Board issues a new tender. Unlikely to achieve a higher price and will delay removal of material which will impact the WRF operations.

Mr. Breen concluded that it is the recommendation of the committee to work with the current contractor as proposed in their letter. Newco proposes to pay the Board 74% of the average price for the material sold to market and will provide the Board a copy of the actual purchase ticket from the end buyer for each of the months that material is removed from the WRFs. The Board will receive a fixed percentage for its material as opposed to a fixed price.

Mr. Grant noted that the Board's focus is on ensuring that the metals collected are recycled and not on generating revenue from the metals. He is satisfied with the proposed arrangement.

Mr. O'Keefe asked how the price will be averaged.

Mr. Grant replied that the price will be averaged on a monthly basis. He noted that the initial contract at \$156.00 per tonne is the same percentage - 74% - of what Newco was receiving at that time. Therefore, the Board continues to receive the same percentage from what Newco receives at market.

It was moved and seconded (D Breen/D Aker) that ERSB accept the terms outlined in the letter from Newco Metal and Auto Recycling Ltd. dated July 31, 2015 for the sale of its metal recyclables. Newco Metal and Auto Recycling Ltd. will pay ERSB 74% of the average price for the material sold to market and will provide ERSB a copy of the actual purchase ticket from the end buyer for each of the months that material is removed from the Board's sites. MOTION 2015-040: Carried (unanimously)

b) <u>Strategy & Policy Committee</u> – S Hickman, Chairperson

i. Robin Hood Bay Methane Utilization and Waste-to-Energy Proposals/Projects – Mr. Hickman directed members to the briefing note in tonight's meeting package (Appendix C) that outlines some of the current developments at the Regional Waste Management Facility located at Robin Hood Bay (RHB) with regards to the use of the methane gas that is produced by the decomposing garbage.

Mr. Hickman continued that currently the methane gas is being burned/flared because it is the most environmentally appropriate approach. In future, the gas may be used to general electricity but this will depend on the Province approving the development of the project. At the moment the parameters that the Province has put on the development may make it unfeasible. The Province has limited the project to producing 2.5 MW which is at the low end of its potential.

In addition, the City of St. John's has received proposals from the private sector to develop waste-to-energy projects at the landfill. There are numerous technologies that can be used.

However, the Province will have to approve a project and waste-to-energy does not fit into the *Provincial Waste Management Strategy* (PWMS). In order for the City or the Board to take this to

the next stage we will need direction from government on its willingness to accept a waste-toenergy project at the site.

City staff are developing a presentation for the Board on the proposals received to date. The presentation should take place at the Board's September 30th meeting.

Mr. Grant stated that the use of waste-to-energy technology is commonplace in other areas. He continued that the PWMS is 15 years old and is simply out-of-date with today's waste technologies. The PWMS discusses organics processing and we know that is not the best solution for the province. The Province will have to lift its restrictions regarding energy production so that we can proceed with selecting the project that is best for the Eastern region. We need to continue to investigate the technologies available to ensure that we choose the best one for us.

Mr. O'Keefe noted that we have a choice of either waiting for the Province to decide or the Board can get proactive and work with the Province to ensure they make the best decision.

- ii. Clarenville Transfer Station Construction Update Presentation Mr. Kelly presented a slideshow of pictures depicting the construction work to date at the Clarenville Transfer Station site. The footings and frost wall were completed in July of this year; weigh scales have been installed and the structural steel is now in place. The transfer station is now ready to be shelled in and once that is completed, the equipment can be installed. Mr. Kelly concluded by stating that the project is on time and on budget for the proposed January 1, 2016 opening.
- iii. Whitbourne Waste Recovery Facility and Equipment Maintenance Depot Mr. Hickman noted the Board has received the decision from the Department of Environment and Conservation that we do not need to register the project for an Environmental Assessment. Therefore, we may proceed to finalize the purchase of the property and the development of the site.
 - Mr. Grant confirmed that the purchase of the property is nearly completed.

Mr. Kelly informed members that the site will be developed in two phases. Phase 1 will be the construction of a waste recovery facility. The WRF may be finished by the end of this year. Once that is completed, the contractor will proceed with Phase 2 which is the construction of a maintenance depot and equipment yard.

iv. **Water Quality Program** – Mr. Hickman stated that as members are aware, the Province has announced a water quality program that would have three regional service boards hire water technicians to provide expertise and assistance to smaller communities grappling with extended boil water advisories.

This program also takes in wastewater including registration of the community wastewater systems with the Federal government.

Included in tonight's briefing note (Appendix D) is a breakdown of the budget that will be provided to each Board to fund this program.

At this time, staff have advertised for the hiring of a water technician for the Eastern region and we will be required to purchase a vehicle to support the program.

It was moved and seconded (S Hickman/H Mullowney) that ERSB agree to participate in the Regional Water and Wastewater Operator Pilot Program under the Community Sustainability Partnership and as outlined in the letter dated July 29, 2015 to ERSB from the Department of Municipal and Intergovernmental Affairs.

MOTION 2015-041: Carried (unanimously)

Mr. Grant informed members that the Province is at the stage of setting up interviews. Members should be assured that no costs incurred for this program will come from the waste management program. The Board is providing oversight of the program in the Eastern region and will be responsible to administer the payroll of the successful candidate. The provision of a vehicle will come from the interest earned on advanced capital funding received from the Province.

v. ERSB Logo and Branding – Mr. Hickman directed members to the logos and branding options included in tonight's meeting package (Appendix E). As members will see two options was discussed. Option 01 is a stand-alone Eastern Regional Service Board logo to be used in all communications. Service division text can be added as growth necessitates. Option 02 is individual logos for ERSB and each division to be used independently in communications with their respective audiences.

It was the consensus of the Strategy & Policy Committee to recommend that ERSB adopt Option 01 regarding branding where the stand-alone Eastern Regional Service Board logo will be used in all communications. Service division text will be added as growth necessitates.

It was moved and seconded (S Hickman/D Aker) that ERSB adopt Option 01 regarding logos and branding where the stand-alone Eastern Regional Services Board logo will be used in all communications. Service division text will be added as growth necessitates. MOTION 2015-042: Carried (unanimously)

Mr. Kelly noted that staff will start transitioning to this logo and branding.

vi. Violators of Bulk and Waste Set-Out Requirements – Mr. Hickman directed members to the briefing noted provided in tonight's meeting package (Appendix F). He continued that this issue stems from two (2) instances of people having bulk garbage and/or regular waste out by the side of the road for extended periods of time. The staff position is that this was set out after the bulk event; and, in the case of torn open garbage, we are not responsible to pick up torn open garbage. The briefing note includes several of the issues that staff encounter.

Mr. Hickman continued that this became an issue for neighbouring property owners and that we are hearing their complaints and it is the neighbouring property owners who are asking for a resolution of the problem. The Board does not have the authority to mandate people clean up their property. The Board could collect the waste and invoice the town or local service district or the property owner as a resolution. If this is the resolution, staff will include a new fee in the budget for 2016 which will be the cost of collecting this material. It will likely be similar to the

cost of the full year of garbage collection if it is treated as full cost recovery - \$150 to \$200 an event.

Mr. Kelly added that again it is the neighbouring property owners who want the resolution and not the actual property owner. The two instances under discussion this evening are in the Local Service District of Deer Park/Vineland Road; however, we have similar instances throughout the Eastern region. Property owners set out their waste late and leave it out. If we go back to collect the waste, then there has been no ramifications and we will be collecting bulk waste every week. To send a collection vehicle to just one property to collect waste will be costly and as Mr. Hickman already noted will be \$150-200 an event.

Mr. Grant stated that his concern is that this makes the Board look bad. LSDs are organized entities and should take some responsibility. They are an elected body who's responsible for the local service district. The Board should inform the LSD committee that they will be invoiced for any clean up. For those who reside in unincorporated areas, the property owner should be invoiced for any required clean up.

Mr. Galgay stated that the property owners for the properties under discussion this evening have been notified on four (4) occasions to clean up the garbage. They have not.

General discussion ensued with the following points:

- We need to send notice regarding the cost and our intent to clean up the garbage and then proceed.
- Put notice on the doors of the properties with a deadline to have the garbage cleaned up.
 If it is not cleaned up by that date, then we clean up the mess and send the property owner an invoice for the cost recovery.
- We should send the invoice to the town office or the local service district committee.
- We should set a fee of \$150 for these one-time collection events as well as a timeline for cleanup on notification to the property owner/town/LSD. For example, provide three (3) days for the cleanup of regular garbage and five (5) days for the cleanup of bulk waste before we send our collection vehicle and staff to perform the cleanup.

<u>Conflict of Interest Notice</u>: Mr. Jonathan Galgay informed the Chairperson that he would abstain from voting on the motion regarding this item as he is a property owner in the Local Service District of Deer Park/Vineland Road.

It was moved and seconded (S Hickman/D Aker) that ERSB would pick up those materials set out for collection after the proper collection day/time if the property owner does not remove the materials in a timely manner. Before ERSB provides the collection, notice will be provided to the town or local service district, where applicable, and to the individual property owner in unincorporated areas. The notification will provide the town/local service district/property owner three (3) days to cleanup regular waste and five (5) days to cleanup bulk waste. If the property is not cleaned up within the timeframe provided, ERSB will remove the waste and will invoice the appropriate party \$150.00 for the cleanup.

MOTION 2015-043: Carried

c) Governance Committee - H Mullowney, Chairperson

i. Letter to Minister Municipal and Intergovernmental Affairs (MIGA) Regarding Regional Governance Advisory Committee - Mr. Mullowney noted that as per several stories in the media recently, this is a very timely discussion. In the past week Municipalities Newfoundland and Labrador (MNL) has been in the news discussing this initiative and the fire at Pinchgut Lake that has resulted in a focus on regionalization. Today on CBC Crosstalk there was a discussion about regional fire services and municipalities providing services outside their municipal boundaries even in cases where people pay no fees. We have an issue here in Newfoundland and Labrador in these areas that exist outside municipal and local service district (LSD) boundaries. Areas that we end up having to support through our municipal and LSD fees and services.

The Minister of MIGA announced a Regional Governance Advisory Committee would be established. Our Committee felt it was appropriate to write the Minister and to advocate for the Board to have representation on the advisory committee given our operational experience across the Eastern region. No one else has grappled with the issues we have of servicing unincorporated areas, collecting fees, identifying property owners, etc. We also have members on the Board who are part of the largest service sharing arrangements in the Province – metro water, wastewater, regional fire, 911 service, etc. As a regional service board we have a lot to bring to the table and we should play a role in shaping the next step in the development of local government.

Mr. Grant stated that a letter has been sent to the Minister of MIGA and a copy is enclosed in tonight's meeting package (Appendix G). He continued that he feels the Board's expertise as well as Mr. Kelly's expertise in this area would certainly be an asset to the proposed advisory committee. The Board should have representation on that committee.

5. New Business

- a. Solid Waste Association of North America (SWANA) Waste Conference 2015 Mr. Grant stated Mr. Breen, Mr. Galgay, Mr. Kelly, Ms. Dean and he attended the SWANA Waste Conference that was held in Orlando, Florida from August 24-27, 2015. The conference consisted of many good sessions with valuable information. Waste-to-energy is a very timely topic.
 - Mr. Breen noted that the conference was very interesting and informative with a lot of information regarding waste-to-energy. It is clear that our *Provincial Waste Management Strategy* is outdated and needs to be updated as it is no longer in line with today's technology.
- b. **ERSB Annual Christmas Dinner Planned for Tuesday, December 8, 2015** Mr. Kelly informed members that the ERSB annual Christmas Dinner is scheduled to take place on Tuesday, December 8, 2015 at The Rooms, St. John's.
- c. **Motor Vehicle Accident 2016 Compactor –** Mr. Kelly informed members that one of the Board's compactors was involved in a single-vehicle accident on Thursday, August 27th. The employee was injured and hospitalized but is now at home and recovering. The employee sustained a broken collarbone, lacerations, bruises, etc. and was quite fortunate that he was

not more seriously injured as the compactor rolled over several times. The accident happened between North Harbour and Colinet.

d. Landfill Firefighting Training – Mr. Kelly stated that the Atlantic Chapter of SWANA and the City of St. John's are hosting a Landfill Firefighting Training session October 29-30, 2015. Mr. Kelly continued that the Board may want to look at sponsoring a firefighter from each of the volunteer fire departments located near our waste recovery facilities. The cost is expected to be approximately \$850-1,000 for each person. This will cover the cost of the training as well as travel, hotel and meals.

General discussion ensued with members agreeing that this would be money well spent. As the Board currently operates eight (8) WRFs, eight volunteer fire departments closest to those WRFs should be provided this opportunity with the Board paying for the training and subsequent costs.

It was moved and seconded (D O'Keefe/D Breen) that ERSB would pay for training for one (1) firefighter from eight (8) volunteer fire departments located near each the Board's waste recovery facilities for the Landfill Firefighting Training being offered by the Atlantic Chapter of SWANA and the City of St. John's on October 29-30, 2015.

MOTION 2015-044: Carried (unanimously)

Briefing Note - Metal Recycling Revenue

Finance and Audit meeting August 12, 2015

At the last Finance and Audit Committee meeting a request from the contractor who is removing metals from our Waste Recovery Facilities was brought forward.

The Contractor Newco Metals and Auto Recycling claims that the global slowdown in commodities is affecting its financial sustainability and its ability to continue under the current terms of the contract. It contracted to pay \$156 plus HST per metric tonne for metals collected at the WRF's. This was based on Newco achieving a price per ton of \$240 at its buyer in Montreal.

Direction from Committee was to meet with the contractor and discuss issue.

Attached is a letter from Newco Metals with some supporting documentation. It is currently achieving prices of \$140 per ton from its buyer in Montreal as of July 2015 pricing.

We have two options:

- 1) Agreement by both parties to amend the terms of the contract as proposed by the contractor.
- 2) Press contractor to fulfill terms or claim breach and sue contractor not likely to get the material moved off site and may have to leave material until issue is resolved significant operational impact on the WRF's, and
- 3) Agreement by both parties that contract is impaired, contract to be terminated by both parties no fault and Board issues a new tender. Unlikely to achieve a higher price and will delay removal of materials which will impact the WRF operations.

Recommendation to work with current contractor on its proposal.

Dear Mr. Kelly:

I would like to thank you for the meeting with you, Mr. Ed Grant, and Ms. Christy Dean to discuss the metal markets and metal recycling in general.

As discussed during the meeting the world market for scrap metal has faced a decline over the past year. Pricing formulas to the end buyer for the material from your sites have also changed in March 2014. Prior to that date all cars/tins mixed scrap had the same price. As of March 2014 any bales or bundles of processed cars/tins that does not include engine blocks had a reduced price of \$50 per ton. The previous formula was in place for 25 years pooling all cars/tins metal into the same price regardless if they included engine blocks or not. No company could predict this change but we also had no control to change it. Newco continued to honour our contractual agreement with Eastern Regional Services Board in 2014 at \$156 per tonne in hopes that both the markets and the formula would change the following year and things would go back to normal. That didn't happen and to make matters worse the entire world market for scrap has faced a virtual collapse, similar issues has plagued the world iron ore markets which is evident in the issues with Wabush Mines and IOC.

Based on our discussion in the meeting we would to offer a price sharing arrangement for the metals collected at your sites. This will be based on the market pricing that is released from the end buyer of your material at the start of the month the material is removed. The price will go up and down based on the market price. In this way Eastern Regional Services Board and Newco Metal and Auto Recycling Ltd will both absorb the reductions in the metal pricing and intern benefit from any increases in value. It also gives the option for both to wait until prices increase to maximise the financial benefit. We have included a copy of an actual copy of the AIM Purchase Ticket listing the price difference between Cascasses D'automobile Sans Moteurttrans (car automobile without motors or trans) and Carcasses D'automobile (car automobile with motors) and is called Appendix 1. This is Purchase Ticket is dated July 15 2015 prior to the last price reduction which is now \$115. At the date of this ticket the prices were \$190 with engine

blocks and \$140 without. We will forward a present purchase ticket once we receive one for this month.

When we submitted the price for the tender it was based on the 2013 average pricing and description of metal which was Cars/Tins with or without engine blocks. The average price over the year was \$210 per tonne. I have included a copy for the 2013 prices as sent to us from a representative of the end buyer and will be called Appendix 2. Our tendered price was \$156 per tonne. This is 74% of the average price for the material as sold to market. The present price for the material from your sites is \$115 per tonne. 74% of the present price of \$115 per tonne will be \$85 per tonne. We will provide you a copy of the actual Purchase Ticket from the end buyer for each of the months we remove material from you sites. Under this arrangement Eastern Regional Waste Management and Newco Metal and Auto Recycling will jointly benefit from the future increases in the world metal markets.

Newco Metal and Auto Recycling Ltd is the holder of a certificate of approval from the Department of Environment, Certificate of Approval COA #WMS-09-09-009. APPENDIX C

Briefing Note - Methane Utilization and Waste-to-Energy

Strategy and Policy meeting August 14, 2015

The City of St. John's is the owner and operator of the Robin Hood Bay facility which is utilized by all municipalities in the Eastern Region as the regional landfill. As such, the City is exploring all options for utilization of commodities and revenue sources associated with the operations of the facility. A methane gas collection system has been installed over approximately 1/3 to 1/2 of the landfill to capture the methane gas and flare the gas. The City will be developing a plan to extend this coverage on an annual basis. Methane gas is a leading contributor to ozone depletion as it is twenty-one times more harmful than C02. Therefore, flaring the methane gas is the environmentally responsible approach to dealing with the byproduct of waste decomposing. The City has commissioned two studies on methane gas, one on the potential for development and a second to quantify the quality of the methane gas produced.

The City has had ongoing discussions with the Province to allow the development of this potential energy source. This energy source has the potential to be developed into a 2.5 to 5 MW electricity generating facility. This potential energy will be impacted by the implementation of organics diversion which will reduce the amount of methane gas available in the future. The Province has asked the City to issue a Request for Proposal (RFP) to determine the issues that industry will bring forward that would impact the ability to receive feasible and competitive proposals for development of this resource.

The Province issued a press release identifying electricity from landfill gas as a project they are looking to develop with a cap of 2.5 MW.

The City receives proposals from various vendors on a regular basis to develop the potential of the RHB asset.

The City has offered to present these proposals to the Board and provide its commentary/opinion on the proposals. We are targeting a meeting in September for this presentation.

APPENDIX D

Briefing Note - Status of Water Quality Program

Strategy and Policy meeting August 14, 2015

In the 2015/16 Budget the Province announced a Regional Water/Wastewater Operator Pilot Program under the Community Sustainability Partnership. The Board is responsible to recruit and employ Regional Water and Wastewater System Operator and to administer the Regional Pilot Program and be responsible to report on program outcomes. The pilot program is for the period October 01, 2015 to March 31, 2019. The position description for the Regional Water and Wastewater System Operator has been developed by the Department of Environment and Conservation.

The primary goal and objective of the Regional Water/Wastewater Operator Pilot Program is to build capacity within communities with respect to the operation and maintenance of their water and wastewater systems. The program targets clusters of communities in the region that operate a public drinking water system and/or wastewater system that are experiencing capacity deficits such as long-term boil water advisories and operational challenges.

The key focus will be capacity-building for water and wastewater infrastructure sustainability to support the provision of clean and safe drinking water and compliance with the Federal Wastewater Systems Effluent Regulations (WSER).

Regional Water/Wastewater Operator Pilot Program Community Sustainability Partnership

This is a follow up to our tele-conference call of July 23, 2015, during which you collectively requested clarification on a number of issues.

It is not the intention of the Pilot Program that the Regional Service Boards be responsible for the direct day to day operational supervision of the Regional Water and Wastewater Operator, but rather will only be responsible to provide general administrative functions related to human resources issues and providing office space from which the Operator will organize, plan and carry out their duties. The Operator would be expected to function in a highly independent manner under general supervision from the Departments of Environment & Conservation and Municipal & Intergovernmental Affairs. Any assessments and reports generated will be directed to the municipality directly involved and copied to the respective department(s).

As outlined in a previous letter, each Board will be given an overall budget of \$292,750 for the period of the Pilot Program. It is expected that each Board will manage their budget in a responsible manner and to report potential issues to MIGA in a timely manner. While the Department is confident that the assigned budget will be sufficient to cover all anticipated cost, it is recognized that issues may arise from time to time that may require additional funds. In those instances the issues will be brought to the attention of MIGA who will consider the alternatives and provide additional funds as deemed necessary. It is not the intentions of the Pilot Program that the Boards are responsible to make up any budget overruns.

During the period of the Pilot Program, the municipalities, being the Owners, will remain wholly liable for the proper maintenance and operation of their respective infrastructure. Any liabilities that may arise will be solely the responsibility of the related municipality(s).

Each Board will be responsible to supply a vehicle at their expense dedicated for the use of their Regional Water/Wastewater Operator for the duration of the Pilot Program. The sole cost to the Board will be the initial cost of procuring the vehicle for that period. All operation, insurance and

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maintenance cost will be taken from the assigned budget provided to the Board. Any budget overruns will be provided as per above clarification on budget overruns above.

APPENDIX F

Briefing Note - Violators of Bulk Collection Set-Out Requirements / Provision of Collection Containers

Strategy and Policy meeting August 14, 2015

A recurring problem across our service area is what to do with those individuals that set out materials for collection, in particular bulk collection, that is either unacceptable for pick up or is set out after the collection day/time.

This can be a particular point of contention for neighbouring properties who are frustrated by the refusal of the individual to deal with the garbage and our refusal to collect the material.

This is not as simple as directing staff to collect the material – sometimes the bulk items are tires, HHW or glass which we do not collect, excessive material, metals which must be separated and transported to a WRF etc,.... The reason we structure the bulk collection events is to ensure that we bring the right equipment and resources to the event to deal with all of these issues. We do tag improper material to identify that we were there and that the material will not be collected because it is not acceptable. Dealing with one off violators is inefficient and costly.

As a regional service board there is no authority to enact regulations or bylaws to fine individuals for improperly placing garbage or having an unsightly premises. The authority for regulation and imposing standards would rest with the local government under Section 178 and 414 of the *Municipalities Act*, 1999. Under this authority it is very clear the areas granted to a council in which it can enact regulations. A council cannot exceed this authorities.

One suggestion is that we charge a property owner if we have to return to collect materials. The cost of returning to collect materials (depending) on the area would be high and would more than likely be construed as a "money grab". This will also be contentious because property owners will claim that we "missed" them and that we have to return.

In a similar fashion we are hampered by a lack of authority to require people to use a container for waste collection. Bags that are left for collection can be torn open by animals and our collectors do not collect material that has been strewn around a property. Provision of containers by the ERSB would be expensive and create other issues without definitively solving the original problem of bags getting torn open. Other issues would include replacement if stolen, damaged containers, placement during winter so as not to impede snow clearing, cleaning of the units, seasonal property owners not able to bring container back in from curb because they have left for the week etc....

Municipalities Act, 1999

Collection, etc. of waste

176. A council shall provide for the collection of solid waste within the municipality and for its disposal in a manner and in a place, either inside or outside the boundaries of the municipality, in accordance with the *Waste Material Disposal Act* and regulations made under that Act.

Charges

- 177. (1) A council may charge a fee to a person who occupies real property, either as owner or tenant of the property, for the collection and disposal of solid waste and may vary these charges by class of premises or by volume of solid waste removed.
 - (2) For the purpose of subsection (1) a tenant does not include a lodger or a boarder.
- (3) A council may exempt from payment of the fee imposed under subsection (1) persons who are subject to the poll tax or to a real property tax imposed with respect to the real property from which solid waste is removed.

Removal of waste

178. A council may remove from real property solid waste, noxious substances and anything that poses a hazard to public health and safety or adversely effects the amenities of the surrounding property, and charge the owner or occupier of the real property for the costs of its collection and disposal.

Council regulations

414. (1) A council shall make regulations

(pp) respecting

- (i) subject to the *Environmental Protection Act*, the administration and management of waste disposal sites, and waste management systems,
- (ii) the storage and collection of solid waste,
- (iii) the prevention of littering, and
- (iv) the definitions of waste and litter;
